## College Access Project

The New Hampshire College & University Council and Campus Compact for New Hampshire have embarked on a collaborative project to assist underserved populations. To accomplish these goals a College Access Team has been created.

The Access New Hampshire Initiative's mission is to **increase opportunities and pathways to assist underrepresented students in accessing higher education opportunities.**

The Access Team is pursuing a number of diverse strategies to increase student retention rates, improve academic success and ease transitions from K-12 to higher education.

The Access New Hampshire Initiative will provide comprehensive resources to

students and schools throughout the state, including:

- Sponsorship of various access programs
- Hosting mini-college fairs at high schools across New Hampshire
- Develop information on financial aid and scholarship resources
- Collaborate closely with partners including The New Hampshire Scholars Program, AmeriCorps\*VISTA programs, and much more!

This initiative will reach underserved populations in all corners of the state including the North Country, Lakes Region, Seacoast, Western corner and the Southern region.



The College Access Initiative is funded by the Jane's Trust Grant.

The goal is to provide all students with the tools to be college and career ready.

# School Spotlight

## Hello Merrimack & Newmarket!



Active Scholars districts. Stay tuned! As many as 2-12 more districts will be added this winter and spring as State Scholar schools.

Interest in New Hampshire Scholars continues to grow. Superintendents and school districts across the state have expressed their desire to bring the program to their schools.

New Hampshire Scholars begins its second phase by adding two more school districts to the initiative. The Merrimack and Newmarket School Districts kick-off the New Year by becoming the first schools in 2008 to newly join as New Hampshire Scholar Districts.

Merrimack Superintendent Marge Chiafery likes the model of the program that is designed to reach students who may not otherwise take a rigorous course load.

"It's designed to get more kids thinking the sky's the limit and if they apply themselves, more opportunities will open up to them," she said.

Merrimack and Newmarket become the first districts in their region to participate. But with extensive business

activity in these areas, other schools will be quick to act on this opportunity.

Bill Cummings, Chairman of the Merrimack Chamber of Commerce Education Committee, says he believes that businesses will enthusiastically support the program.

"From where I stand, a lot of kids just seem to take the minimum amount and just skate by. I think this is going to make them think twice about that," he said.

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## Data Collection—Pilot Schools

The next round of data is for the Fall 2007-08 school year and will include two files. Submission Course should be uploaded first and corrected for errors before uploading Student Class.

Please upload to i4see at <http://www.ed.state.nh.us/education/datacollection/i4see.htm> Click on the ESS Workbench and follow the

steps to login and upload your data.

**The 1st File** includes the courses which are available at your school and will be entered by submitting the **Submission Course file**.

**The 2nd file** is the **Student Class file** listing all of the students (grades 9-12) and the courses they took,

including grades received.

Please remember that the school year will be 2008 when submitting your data. This file no longer asks for the Course ID, but instead asks for the Local Class Code.


## School Implementation




## State Scholars Initiative

New Hampshire Scholars is part of the State Scholars Initiative, a national program that uses business leaders to motivate students, beginning in Grade 8, to complete a rigorous course of study in high school—one that will give them a boost in college and careers. New Hampshire Scholars encourages and motivates **ALL** high school students to complete a rigorous course of study that prepares them for college and careers.



This is a Federal grant-funded program developed and administered through a partnership between the New Hampshire College and University Council, the New Hampshire Forum on the Future, the New Hampshire Department of Education and the National State Scholars Initiative Network.

## National State Scholars Issues DVD

The State Scholars Initiative has issued an informational video to all participating states. Copies of the "Do the Math" DVD are available and will be mailed to each of the participating districts in New Hampshire.

The 17-minute video provides interviews with a wide range of professionals: a Nobel Prize-winning physicist, a TV sports reporter, an MIT robot-inventor, a fashion designer, an award-winning composer, a Princeton sociologist (the first in her family to go to college) and much more.

The business leaders were asked to tell students in

real-life terms why a rigorous course of study that includes math, science, social studies, English, and foreign language is so important today and critical to their work.

In addition, high school students in several SSI states were asked to reflect on their dreams for the future and how a rigorous course of study like State Scholars could help them achieve those dreams.

The DVD is a nice complement to include in a program or activity for New Hampshire Scholars. It is a worthwhile look at the importance of challenging

coursework.

Newmarket Junior High School utilized it as part of their 8th grade "kick-off" event and students reacted favorably to it.
